

Executive summary

In response to COVID-19, the NHS has launched one of the largest public vaccination programmes ever. To help local services and national policymakers understand how they can improve the vaccination programme, Healthwatch County Durham circulated and promoted a survey, developed by Healthwatch England in June 2021.

The survey questions aimed to help gauge young people's attitudes to, and experience of, the vaccination programme.

Survey results

The NHS is doing everything it can to deliver COVID-19 vaccines, but there might be things that could be improved. We wanted to know:

- What young people aged 16 30yrs in County Durham think about the vaccine programme
- Whether they would be willing to have the vaccine if they had not already, and if they have already had the vaccine
- What they thought about information on the vaccination programme

We are using the results to help local services better target communities and improve their vaccine service.

Observations


From the information provided in our survey we have made the following observations:

- A high percentage of young people who completed the survey are very positive about vaccines in general and in particular about receiving the COVID-19 vaccine.
- This positive view could be because of the positive adverts/messages promoted by the NHS nationally and locally or could be because people wish to protect friends and family, as 83.5% of those completing the survey said this was their main reason.
- Although 66.04% of young people said nothing would stop them from getting the vaccine, the distance to the location where the vaccine appointment takes place might stop 17.92% of young people and also the times available to have the vaccine (12.26%).
- Of those young people who said they would not want to be vaccinated, the top 3 reasons were they would want others to have it first (26.23%), were worried about the vaccine's safety (24.59%) or they were concerned about the ingredients in it (22.95%).

Covid-19 Vaccination programme



- The majority of young people (58.65) said they would trust the Government or NHS website to give accurate information about the vaccine. The next trusted was Chief Scientific Officer/Chief Medical Officer/Senior NHS staff (40.60%) followed by an NHS website, GP practice, pharmacy, clinic or hospital (39.85%)
- Because all the survey responses we received were from white British or other white ethnicity we are unable to reach any conclusions about the attitudes or views of Black Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) communities to the vaccination programme





Background to our work

The Government's COVID-19 vaccines delivery plan aims to vaccinate tens of millions of people. We promoted this survey to support feedback of rapid insight to Government and local services about how the vaccine programme is working, with a focus on young people aged 16 - 30yrs. The survey helped us to gather information about young people's attitudes to COVID-19

vaccines and communications.

We focused the questions on attitudes to and communications about COVID-19 vaccinations for young people for two reasons:

- Younger people have been shown in polling to have slightly lower rates of willingness to get vaccinated. For example, a recent ONS report showed that around 1 in 6 (17%) adults aged 16 to 29 years old reported vaccine hesitancy.
- Surveying attitudes and communications allows us to see who may be sceptical of the vaccine and how communications can be delivered with their concerns in mind.



What we did


To collect young people's views on the COVID-19 vaccine we used social media and published our survey on line via our e bulletin. Due to the current COVID restrictions there was no face to face engagement but we did share the survey with our network of organisations working across County Durham. The survey was developed by Healthwatch England for each local Healthwatch to use the questions to gather information locally about young people's attitudes to COVID-19 vaccines and communications.

What we found:

- 93 (69.92%) young people were very positive in general about vaccinations with 30 (22.56%) people being fairly positive
- 60 (45.11%) young people had already received their COVID-19 vaccine
- 32 (59.10) young people confirmed that they definitely would have the vaccine when offered it
- 10 (7.52%) young people told us they would probably not/definitely not have the vaccine
- 5 (3.76%) young people weren't sure if they would have it




Although 70 (66.04%) young people told us nothing would prevent them from getting the COVID-19 vaccination, 19 (17.92%) said the distance to the location where the vaccine appointment would take place might stop them from getting it.



Where people indicated "Other reason" this is a summary of their views:


- I faint and have no friends to go with me as I moved up here during lockdown
- There has been speculation that the vaccine could affect menstruation and fertility
- Research behind the vaccine
- It hasn't been tested enough
- Side effects
- Trying for a baby





The graph below shows the main reasons why people wanted the COVID-19 vaccine.

The graph below shows the main reasons why young people would not want to be vaccinated.






133 young people answered the question around where they have mainly seen or heard information about the COVID-19 vaccine, with the most common themes being:

- An NHS or government website (67.67%)
- Social media (66.17%)
- TV/Radio (45.86%)
- Friends/relatives (43.61%)
- Newspaper/online news websites (35.34%)
- Government press conference (33.83%)


We asked all respondents what they thought about the information that they have heard or seen towards the vaccine, 85 (63.91%) young people thought it was positive; a further 37 (27.82%) young people said the information was a mixture of positive and negative.

When we asked who they would most trust to give them accurate information about the COVID-19 vaccine 78 (58.65%) young people said a Government or NHS website. Only 4 (3.01%) said they would trust social media.



Of the young people who answered our survey 91 (71%) identified as female, 36 (27.69%) as male, 2 (1.54%) as non-binary with 1 person preferring not to say. 126 (98.44%) young people were "white British", 2 (1.56%) were "any other white" while 1 person preferred not to say.





We also asked them to provide their age and the graph below shows the breakdown:

77 (60.16%) young people said they had no religion while 39 (30.47%) said they were Christians.

We asked people to provide us with the first half of their postcode to enable us to identify which localities were represented. The main postcode areas are DH1, DL5, DH6 and DH3.

Conclusions

We wanted to know:

- What young people aged 16 30yrs in County Durham think about the vaccine programme
- Whether they would be willing to have the vaccine if they had not already and if they have already had the vaccine
- What they thought about information on the vaccination programme

In conclusion we found the majority of young people were very positive about vaccines in general and almost 85% of respondents had either had the COVID-19 vaccine or definitely would have it. The majority of young people also got their information about the vaccine from a Government or NHS website and/or social media and that information was positive towards a COVID-19 vaccine. They said that they would most trust a Government or NHS website to provide accurate information. Only 4 people said they would trust social media.
