## **Introduction**

Healthwatch Central Bedfordshire (HWCB) was proud to host the 9th 'Festival for Older People' (the Festival). The Festival is held annually in October to coincide with 'International Older People's Day' that celebrates the achievements and contributions older people make to society; the theme for 2022 was 'the Resilience and Contribution of Older Women'

The Festival is an opportunity for older people to find out more about the health and social care support services available to them within their local community. The event also offers activities, refreshments, entertainment and the opportunity to purchase handmade goods as well as pamper sessions.

HWCB also developed a snapshot survey called 'Access to Health & Social Care Services', which was distributed at the Festival, to enable us to hear more from visitors about the health and social care services they may have accessed in the last year. The results of the survey are summarised in Appendix A.

We were able to secure valuable funding for the event this year from sponsors:

- Circle Integrated Services
- Flitwick Town Council

Cakes and pastries were once again donated by catering students at Central Bedfordshire College, volunteers and staff from HWCB, with all proceeds being donated to Macmillan. The Macmillan cake stand was manned by HWCB volunteers and friends with help from a young Healthwatch volunteer. Over £254 was raised for this worthwhile charity.

Planning for the Festival commenced in July 2022, which involved HWCB staff and volunteers meeting to discuss learning from the previous year's Festival, sharing new ideas and to plan publicity and promotion for the event.

The venue for the Festival was The Rufus Centre in Flitwick (Central Bedfordshire) which can accommodate larger numbers of people and has excellent disabled and parking facilities. The Macmillan cake stand was located in the Davis Suite.

The event was widely advertised across Bedfordshire and included a radio interview with 'Biggles FM' - Alan Waring's weekday morning show, as well BBC Three Counties radio. Posters were exhibited in church halls, supermarkets, libraries, care homes and housing associations, and advertisements were placed in Town and Parish Council Newsletters, as well as local newspapers and community magazines including Flitwick Papers, The Villager and The Oracle, with stakeholders additionally promoting the event.

We also advertised on 46 local Facebook groups reaching over 9,500 people, with 106 event responses and 230 'engagements'. Visitors said they heard about the event via their local newspaper, word of mouth, the Sight Concern newsletter, doctors' surgeries, HWCB Just Ask events and via direct email. Over 146 exhibitors were invited to attend the event and were provided with posters and press releases, and encouraged to advertise the event via their networks.

We also regularly promoted the event in the weeks leading up to the Festival via our weekly eBulletin and on our website.

For those unable to access public transport due to a physical or learning disability, or less able visitors with walking aids, HWCB organised transport with Central Bedfordshire Council Transport Services, to enable them to attend the event.

Deputy Lieutenant Dr Robert Oakley OBE, and the Deputy Director for Healthwatch England, Chris McCann, officially opened the event. Chris attended in place of Healthwatch England's National Director, Louise Ansari, who was unwell and unable to attend. The Mayor of Flitwick, Andy Snape, and Lady Clifford, the High Sheriff of Bedfordshire, also came along to offer their support for the event.

A total of 45 exhibitors attended the Festival, providing a wide range of information, advice and guidance relating to the services they provide; many exhibitors had joined the event previously and wanted to return, others were new to the Festival and we welcomed the addition of new exhibitors. The Festival creates an opportunity for health and social care organisations, that provide information, advice, and support to older people, to come together in one place. Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) joined the event with representation from several of their departments - Libraries, Community Engagement, Safer Communities and Active Lifestyles.

A full programme of entertainment was introduced by compere Richard Compton - 'Mike Gee' and 'May Blossom Vintage Songbird' who entertained visitors with songs from the 50's, 60's and 70's.

Dennis Lee, Director of HWCB and a qualified fitness instructor, provided a session of seated Tai Chi based exercises. Kezia Jolly, of Creative Connections, provided a session of seated dancing specifically designed for people with Parkinson's disease and dementia, however everyone joined in! There were several exhibitors selling hand made goods including 'Scritsy' and 'Chrissy B'.

One of the most popular stalls was the Bedfordshire Fire and Rescue Service who provided a wealth of information, support and smoke alarm testing sticks to visitors.

The 'Wellbeing Room' offered blood pressure checks (machine provided by Barton House Group Practice) with 37 visitors taking advantage of this service.

Visitors were advised that If their blood pressure was higher than a previous test they may have had elsewhere, or if they felt the result was abnormal, it was suggested they make an appointment to see their doctor, and two visitors said they would do this.

Over 255 visitors attended the event travelling from 29 different towns and villages across Bedfordshire and other counties. Most visitors arrived by car.

All visitors were asked to complete an evaluation form about the event and 81 forms were completed. All forms were entered into the prize draw to win a hamper.

Exhibitors were also asked to complete an evaluation form during or after the event and, of the 45 exhibitors that attended, all exhibitors have already asked to rebook in 2023.

## **Feedback - visitors**

To encourage feedback from visitors they were offered the chance to win a hamper via a prize draw (donated by Waitrose, Ampthill and the Co-op in Barton and Silsoe) by completing an evaluation form. This year the hamper was won by a lady from Clophill.

All visitors and exhibitors were invited to provide feedback about the event which allows HWCB to evaluate what worked well and what could be improved for future Festivals. Some examples of this feedback is summarised as follows:

## Of the 81 evaluation forms that were completed by visitors:

- ♦ 72% thought that the event was' excellent'
- 18% thought that the event was 'very good'
- Over 95% said they were able to visit all of the stalls
- Just over 6% said that they could not visit all of the stalls although reasons given were not clear

### Of the 29 evaluation forms completed by stallholders:

- 70% rated the organisation of the event as 'excellent'
- 28% rated the organisation as 'good'
- 100% of exhibitors said they would like to attend in 2023

Only a small number of visitors completed the 'Access to Health & Social Care Services' survey and the results are summarised later in the report.

Overall, the event was very well received and enjoyed by visitors and exhibitors. Positive comments from visitors included; 'fun', 'informative', and 'well organised'. However, a few people thought that the venue was 'overcrowded', a 'bit loud' and 'very hot'.

It was also noted that a few visitors found that wheelchair access could be improved and more seating provided. Other comments given as follows:

'Diabetes information wanted'

'It is always the highlight of the calendar year!'

'Very useful, very informative, enjoyed finding and talking about things happening in the area.'

'Great Festival – every health issue was covered, and I really enjoyed it'

#### **Our Response**

Some arrangements and details for the event cannot be changed for various reasons but it is important to let people know their comments and feedback about the event is taken into consideration when planning future events. In answer to particular comments received this year:

- The diabetes team were invited and due to attend. Unfortunately they had to cancel on the morning of the event they will be invited to attend next year.
- ◆ The Rufus Centre is one of the largest venues available to us within Central Bedfordshire which has the amenities we need, that is centrally located in a suitable area for all to easily access from across Central Bedfordshire - Over the years we have investigated other venues but unfortunately they do not meet all our requirements.
- Due to the high volume of visitors, the venue did become very busy at times and subsequently became over warm in some areas - Doors and windows were opened where possible and visitors moved along to other areas that were less crowded.
- Once again, due to the high volume of visitors, more people had to use the lift to gain access to the entertainment/ refreshment area on the first floor; this caused some congestion and made wheelchair movement more difficult -This will be looked at when planning for the Festival next year to see how we can mitigate or ease congestion in this area.

Additional seating was provided by Bluebird Care in their offices as well as in the exhibition rooms themselves - Due to limited space around the stall areas it is difficult to provide additional seating, although we will look at this when planning next year's Festival.

## Feedback - stallholders & VIPs

Approximately half of all stallholders confirmed they had promoted the Festival mainly via their Facebook, website and posters.

86% of stallholders confirmed they had adequate room on and around their stand.

Over 96% of stallholders said that the positioning of their stand was suitable for their requirements, with only one stallholder who did not respond.

100% of respondents said that the event met their expectations.

#### **Our Response**

We would like to sincerely thank all the stallholders and VIPs for their feedback and for contributing to a very successful event.

As the event attracts people from across all areas of Bedfordshire we invite organisations that cover a wider area to bring as much information with them as possible to be able to provide each visitor with information about the local services to them.

We are aware that more vulnerable members of our community may not be able to attend the Festival due to physical or learning disabilities and we work closely with Central Bedfordshire Council's (CBC) Transport Services to help people to attend who otherwise would not be able to. CBC Transport Services kindly agree to transport individuals, or groups of people, to the Festival who had advised us in advance that they required additional support. Clearly we are restricted in the areas that we can cover (there are only a certain number of buses available), although we always attempt to organise people into 'groups' to enable as many people as possible to attend. Information is also provided, via all the advertising undertaken for the event, to contact us for support with transport, so it is open to anyone to request support if needed.

In previous years attendees have travelled from over 42 towns and villages, including eight from outside Central Bedfordshire. Buses provided by CBC cover only a few areas, and are not representative of all those that actually attend the event. This year they covered the following areas:

- Houghton Regis group of 10
- Marston Moretaine group of 4

#### Survey results - Access to Health & Social Care Services

HWCB developed a snapshot survey called 'Access to Health & Social Care Services', which was distributed at the Festival, to enable us to hear more from visitors about the health and social care services they may have accessed during the last year. Unfortunately, the number of visitors who completed the survey was fairly low as the majority of visitors were busy visiting the stands or joining in with the entertainment, and some were hesitant about interacting with staff, due to lingering concerns relating to the pandemic.

The results of the survey can be found below:

Question 1 asked visitors if they had tried to access any health and social care services (or for someone they care for).

All respondents had tried to access health and social care services. When asked which service they had tried to access services for, 33% said they had accessed a GP for themselves, 33% said it was for a relative, and 33% said they had called an ambulance.

Question 2 asked visitors how happy they were with the speed of the response.

66% said that they were 'very happy', and 33% said they were 'not very happy'.

Question 3 asked if they (or the person they care for) received an appointment from the service that they contacted.

Of the 66% that said they were happy with the speed of response, both people received an appointment from the service they had contacted. Unsurprisingly, the 33% that were not happy had not received an appointment.

Question 4 asked what the outcome of the appointment was e.g., referral, further appointment, hospital procedure.

Of those that had not received an appointment there were various outcomes including being moved to a different GP with a subsequent referral to hospital, and as a consequence, being seen within two weeks.

Other patient outcomes included a six week hospital stay; also a new telephone being fitted with larger numbers due to being partially blind.

Question 5 asked if they (or the person they care for) already had a scheduled hospital procedure e.g., surgery/ treatment, and did it take place as planned.

The people who completed the survey who had hospital stays, confirmed that their scheduled hospital procedure took place as planned.

Question 6 asked visitors how they would describe their gender (or the person you care for).

All respondents were female.

Question 7 asked the age of the visitors? (or the age of the person they care for).

66% of respondents were in the 70-80 year age group, and 33% respondents were in the 50-60 year age group.

Question 8 asked which area of Central Bedfordshire they live in (or the person they care for).

66% of respondents live out of county and 33% live in Ampthill.
